EDUCATING THE



GENERATION







In Andrew Lloyd Weber's iconic musical "Evita," the lead character sings about the importance of "getting them while they're young." It's a philosophy volunteer Shannon Breznai endorses, and it underlies the League's Humane Education Program that last year reached out to touch 882 young minds.

Children from ages 5 and up enrolled in more than 39 separate programs conducted by Shannon in 2018. Most of the classes, with a maximum of 16 attendees, were held primarily at the League's shelter, but since they could also be conducted off site, some were held in schools and public libraries.

A former pre-school teacher for 12 years, Shannon finds her work with children consistently rewarding. "There's always something in these classes that a kid says that lets me know a seed has been planted," she says. "Even if it's only one child, it's so worth it."

Classes are free (with donations accepted) and are offered by topic. Two of the most popular are "Taking Care of Our Cats and Dogs" and "Pets Have Feelings, Too," with the content of each modified to suit the appropriate age level.

There are eight class topics in all, with the remaining programs dealing with the advantages of adopting senior pets, the problems caused by pet over-population and how it can be prevented (spoiler alert: the answer is spaying and neutering pets at an early age), service/therapy dogs and cats and how they can help people with various special needs, and the history of modern-day domesticated cats and dogs. Underlying each program is a clear message: kindness and respect for all of God's creatures.

Shannon's expertise was earned over nine months studying to acquire national certification as a Humane Education Specialist, a goal she decided to pursue after she began volunteering at the League in 2017. After earning her certification, she was listed on the national registry of humane educators. Along with social media and classes advertised on the League's website, this is how many of the requests for classes reach her.

On average, Shannon receives one to three requests a week for classes, and she conducts an average of one class every week. Often, attendees are members of scouting troops needing to earn badges, but sometimes requests come from schools and Shannon takes these opportunities to talk about various career options available to those interested in someday working with animals.

Onsite classes held at the League include a tour of the shelter and the opportunity to interact with a cat or dog. And all classes usually end with some type of age-appropriate activity. For younger children, constructing artwork of dogs or cats made out of heart cutouts is always popular, while older children often enjoy making posters outlining things they've learned in the class.

Education is a major part of the League for Animal Welfare's core mission. Through the dedication of this Northern Kentucky native, who says she inherited her love of animals from her dad, Shannon is passing this along to the next generation, including her nine-year-old son, Jack, who loves volunteering at the League every bit as much as his mother.

Without a doubt, Evita would be so proud!


Legacy Society The 1949 Legacy Society recognizes

The League is pleased to recognize the following individuals who joined the 1949 Legacy Society between January 1, 2018 and December 31, 2018.






Cats
